

## **BITE RECIPE - STORYTELLING**



In this Bite you improvise a story developed (to a greater or lesser extent, according to your experience and confidence) based on the children's ideas. Weave into the story an aspect of the global issue you want to tackle.

## Ingredients:

- Carefully chosen artefacts to help tell the story. This works particularly well with one of the GLADE musical instrument collections (there are a number to choose from) as the children can participate by using the instruments to represent animals etc.
- A maximum of 12 children, or 8 if you have parents/carers there too, who should be encouraged to join in.
- Space to sit in a circle. On the floor on cushions is good; better still in a large yurt or bell tent, to give a sense of intimacy.

## Method:

time: promise 20 mins max and stick to it.

**Age range:** 3 to young teenage – latter should see themselves as helpers – cooler than participating!

- Preparation: you need a basic idea for your story, to make sure it can incorporate your global issue (probably as a sort of parable). Decide in advance how you will use the children's ideas and activities. The less confident you are the less you should leave
  - to improvisation. For example you could use African untuned instruments to represent animal noises; or they could use everyday artefacts to mime cooking, cleaning, etc and act out your story. But make sure *every* child will be reasonably involved, with adult help where necessary. Make sure you can supply a wide and intriguing selection of artefacts or instruments for the children to choose from.
- Start by letting the children choose and try out the artefact or instrument they want to use, and practise its use.
- Let each child individually demonstrate what he/she has chosen.
- Practise letting them respond to a cue in the story ("the dog barked ..." "she swept the floor" etc)
- Tell the story (try to include a grand finale which uses all the children at once.)
- If the mood is right, debrief the significance of the story with the children.

Global issues raised: this will depend on your story!

Watchpoint: You have to move things on quickly, and chivvy the children to react to cues.

Where to use this global bite: Holiday schemes, fêtes, fairs

**Variations on the theme**: For a slightly longer activity include dressing up. If you have amused the children in the adults' absence, turn it into a little show for the adults, and make sure you debrief the global issue to them too.
