

They are a welcome boost to our professional capacity and, led by Lynn, have already launched enthusiastically into GLADE's programme of activity. I hope that they, and the rest of the GLADE family, enjoy their work and come to share with the Trustees a sense of challenge and achievement.

Programme Director's Report

Introduction

The GLADE Centre; "building knowledge, skills and attitudes for change in a global society."

Since 1993 the GLADE Centre has helped people of all ages learn about the world and its people, building the key idea of interdependence and local action for change.

We help people find their own interests with local-global connections, leading to action and agency, entry points and themes include through Intercultural Understanding, Sustainability, Global Citizenship, and Human Rights.

Strengths we have carried forward into our work this year include:-

- Being a locally-based charity, existing "to advance the education of the public in all matters relating to world and community development, including but not by way of limitation cultural, economic, environmental issues and other related aspects."
- Being known locally, nationally, internationally for leading high quality training, running inspirational workshops and delivering new projects that make connections between global and intercultural issues, and local contexts.
- Being a diverse team with wide experience so we are adept at exploring global themes and spotting their local implications with entry points or 'lenses' depending on the interests of the audience and community.
- Being flexible yet always with a participatory and reflective approach helping people of all ages CONNECT-CHALLENGE-CHANGE:

Connect people with global and local issues through activity, people and real-life examples,

Challenge and explore peoples' preconceptions by talking and listening, reflecting and facilitating dialogue,

Going on to Change the way people think about and act for the world and our own localities

 Spotting and acting on opportunities to build relationships, to build relevance and longevity into our work while widening our reach further into Somerset.

Headlines of The GLADE Centre's year:-

This has been a year of "bright ideas" coming to fruition and "lightbulb moments" providing opportunities for reviving contacts and connections for the next year or so.

- Gaining funding for our 3-year project A PLACE CALLED HOME from National Lottery Heritage Fund
- Creatively working with SPAEDA to combine the Romantic Poets with climate action learning for children in the outdoors spaces on the Quantocks.
- Sharing enterprising ideas from amazing students and teachers in Estonia, Germany, Slovenia, Turkiye and the UK to build global learning for social enterprise.
- Appointing 5 new project workers who are Heritage Associates with dedicated time for community development, made possible with National Lottery Heritage Fund
- Gaining new expertise and support for our website from George at Kernel IT Services, and creating new online spaces to widen our reach.
- Reshaping our Global Loans Service of powerful objects, curious artefacts and memorable items for deepening learning. This includes better grouping of our artefacts into Country Collections, Literacy Collections, Numeracy Collections, Creativity Collections.
- Creating and curating online materials for teachers who book loans of our Collections. And offering a workshop as a timesaver for busy teachers to deepen learning through handling items, building curious learners and critical thinkers.
- Submitting a successful bid to Somerset Council for us to bring a critical thinking mindset to the Interfaith and Belief Network for Somerset, posing a big question "how can Somerset societies build and sustain a sense of belonging, interdependence, relevance and agency when there is fast change worldwide associated with People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace and Partnership?"
- Gaining an experienced co-worker to build and strengthen the Interfaith and Belief Network for Somerset and to widen our reahc into community audiences

Projects that ended this year included:-

• Educate4Enterprise.org:- Funded by Erasmus+ and led by Global Education Derby, this partnership project sought to increase teaching and learning for enterprise education and creativity. Spring 2023 saw the end of project funding from Erasmus+, and an end to project

collaboration with Global Education Derby and partners in Estonia, Germany, Slovenia and Turkiye. The focus of this 3 year project was teaching and learning for enterprise education and creativity. Our project partners are lead practitioners on this in their respective countries. My role was devising and leading training, seeking opportunities where global learning adds value to entrepreneurship education, and focusing on core skills of creativity, critical thinking, collaboration and citizenship. The focus group were teachers who inspire and lead successful social and economic enterprise, with students and with colleague. The project resulted in online teacher materials, freely available, a self-paced teacher's online course and legacy has fed into teacher and social enterprise workshops now available on request from The GLADE Centre.

- Teach Climate Justice:- Funded by Oxfam and led Liverpool World Centre, this allowed me to deliver a relevant and timely series of 3 workshops to trainee teachers, preparing them for teaching climate justice during school placements in Somerset primary schools. Our delivery of this short course for trainee teachers "captured the trainees' imaginations, inspired them to make a difference and helped them consider and develop their role as future educators". We look forward to making this course and a new quality mark for schools wanting to be more climate friendly, available to teachers across Somerset during 2024. Aligned with DfEs Sustainability and Climate Change Strategy and the curriculum, it will be timesaving for teachers, award school recognition and relieve eco-anxiety and climate-anxiety for pupils.
- Guided International Partnerships, June 2022 to November 2022:- I delivered a series of 4 interactive webinars for British Council, guiding new partnerships between clusters of schools in the UK and schools in Bangladesh, Pakistan, Nepal, Egypt through the very earliest stages of partnership. This follows the successful first three iterations under the Connecting Classrooms through Global Learning programme in which over 500 UK and overseas teachers took part in learning in partnership activities with their classes, on the themes of COP27, hosted by Egypt, and Climate Change.

We're looking forward:-

To continuing delivery of A Place Called Home project, including connecting people with social heritage through new social learning activities, getting people to examine and challenge their perceptions with objects from home, heritage and cultural items and artefacts that prompt memories. We'll be releasing opportunities for volunteers, invitations to workshops with our Heritage Associates and short-term placements to be involved in co-creating materials. From September 2023, convening the Interfaith and Belief Network for Somerset, under a 3-year contract funded by Somerset Council. Find out what our focus is and join in at https://interfaithbelief.glade.org/

From October 2023, delivering the refreshed Guided Partnerships offer for British Council. The support offer of four two-weekly webinars for clusters of up to 6 UK schools and 6 overseas schools in 1-to-1 pairs. All these schools are new to international partnerships when building educational relationships to underpin reciprocal curriculum activity and equitable relationships is most important. Autumn term clusters are partnered with Iraq and United Arab Emirates.

From late Autumn 2023, releasing opportunities for recognition of classroom practice with The Global Teacher Award. To make good use of time, these will be scheduled as live, online courses with an option to self-accredit your school and gain the Global School Award. Small numbers will ensure the workshops are interactive and create space for collaborative and reflective professional development. During 2023 into 2024 continuing to collaborate with SPAEDA for teacher workshop delivery within the Quantocks Landscape Partnership Scheme. Within the inspirational work SPAEDA are leading "In the Footsteps of the Romantic Poets", we'll be running sessions with focus on climate change, mitigating risks and welcoming change. We'll help teachers adopt a "hope not fear" approach, as the project connects children with the Quantocks and one of it's wishes is to mitigate climate anxiety being experienced at the moment.

I'd like to say a big thank you to Trustees for their untiring support for the GLADE Centre and our workers. They listen, advise, inspire and importantly, remain loyal to our aims in a fast-moving world. Behind the scenes, we have volunteers, some are trustees, who are so valuable to GLADE, thank you for all you do.

Finally, colleagues at Global Education Derby have been close friends for a long time to the GLADE Centre and indeed to the sector; leading, inviting, supporting, commissioning, collaborating and be-friending. It's with real regret that we say goodbye to them, as their doors closed at the end of August, after 30 years, funding challenges will leave a big gap. A heartfelt thanks to David, Yvonne, Lisa and Rubi and to the GED Trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the recommendations in Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting for Charities (SORP) issued in October 2000 as updated January 2003.

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts. It is shown in full in the Statement of Financial Activities, when received. Gifts in kind are valued at their estimated value to the charity and are included under the appropriate headings.

Intangible income is valued and included in income to the extent that it represents goods or services where another party is bearing the financial cost and the benefit is quantifiable. Where it is difficult or not possible to quantify the benefit, or where there is no financial cost borne by another party (eg. Volunteers), the accounts do not include the intangible income.

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received.

Restricted funds are to be used for the specific purposes as required by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is allocated to the relevant fund. Income derived from these funds is retained within the funds concerned. Designated funds are unrestricted funds which the trustees have designated to be used for a specific purpose. Where these funds yield investment income, this is available for general purposes. Unrestricted funds are funds which are not designated or restricted.

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.

Depreciation is calculated at a rate to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets on a reducing balance basis over their estimated useful lives. The rates applied per annum are as follows:

12. RISK ASSESSMENT

The directors actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The directors have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

13. RESERVES POLICY

The directors have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of financial commitments held. The directors aim to ensure the charity will be able to continue to fulfil its charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income or unexpected expenditure. The directors will endeavour not to set aside funds unnecessarily.

ACCOUNTANTS REPORT TO THE MEMBERS ON THE UNAUDITED ACCOUNTS OF THE GLADE CENTRE

We report on the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023 set out on pages 3 to 10.

Respective responsibilities of directors and reporting accountants.

As described on page 5 the trustees, who are also the directors of The Glade Centre for the purpose of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts, and they consider that the company is exempt from an audit. It is our responsibility to carry out procedures designed to enable us to report our opinion.
